As we celebrate our 150th birthday and the generations of amazing women that have gone before us, we also look to the future with our current students here in 2021.

Every day at this school students inspire me. Every day there are new achievements, new heights of sporting and cultural excellence and new and surprising interests and activities taking place in our school. This doesn't happen by accident but rather arises from the commitment of an amazing team of staff, students, parents and community. Particular thanks goes to the School Board, PTSA, Sports Council and Arts Council for making things happen and providing steady and progressive governance and fundraising at our school. We are blessed with amazing facilities and supportive community connections in every area.

Learning is at the heart of everything we do and when students learn well, they feel good and they set their goals high. Engagement, achievement and wellbeing are interlinked. Despite the challenges of the COVID-19 lockdown in 2020, our students achieved the highest results in NCEA, including 19 Scholarships, six Outstanding Scholarships and three Top Scholars in New Zealand in Media Studies, Sculpture and French. The New Zealand Top Scholars Awards were presented by Jacinda Ardern, Prime Minister of New Zealand, and Chris Hipkins, Minister for Education, at Parliament in May.

We continue to be a Positive Behaviour for Learning school and our new initiative Connecting through Curriculum encourages respectful relationships focused on learning and developing emotional intelligence for future success. Our local curriculum centres on our Malaga - navigating our journey - and describes the principles and learner capabilities we foster in our students. We have a new student-led initiative around respect and kindness - Kotahitanga - which fosters inclusion and respect across all groups and peoples. The focus of this will be Cultural Day early in Term Three.

Cultural Highlights have been our very successful performance season of "Cry Baby" the combined OBHS/OGHS Senior Production, Wairua Pūhou's incredible performance for Hautonga, and the Choir and combined OBHS/OGHS choir performances in the Big Sing. They are two of 12 South Island choirs that have been selected to compete in Timaru in late August.

Year 9 student Anna Feillet's songwriting success gained her

1st Place in the New Zealand Music competition "Hook, Line & Sing Along" for her composition "Aroha / Aotearoa". Her song was sung in schools all over NZ in a mass sing-a-long on the last day of New Zealand Music Month. Our Show Quest dancers' superb performance won third place in Otago. Sophia Niblock Year 13 won 1st Place and a \$500 Scholarship in the Click Happy "Gratitude" Photography competition and our Arts Prefect Freya Pettigrew has worked hard to see her wonderful new initiative realised in the form of The Otago Secondary Schools' Portfolio Exhibition, which brings together art portfolios from a selection of schools.

Sporting highlights this year include the promotion of our Senior A Netball Team into the Premier Women's grade, Catherine Lund gaining 10th place in the National Year 11 to 13 Cross Country Championships, two year 13's being selected for the Otago Spirit Rugby team, winning the Senior A Sevens Rugby title, the Junior A Sevens Rugby title and being sunner Runners Up in the Junior B competition. Two teams competed in the inaugural season of the high schools' eSports competition. We currently have ex-pupils from our school in the New Zealand White Ferns cricket team, the New Zealand Black Ferns Sevens Rugby team, the Southern Steel Netball team and the New Zealand Kayak Squad.

In February, at our Founder's Day celebrations, we unveiled the Pare in our school foyer and each and every student passed under this into the hall, which represents the heart of our school. The Pare was carved by Ngāi Tahu master carver James York who then gave a korero about all of the significant elements of the installation. We will unveil Helen Pollock's 150th sculpture at the celebrations in October. In conjunction with the Otago Museum we also have a Street Art project in conception which will be based around the Chambered Nautilus. We look forward to the installation of lighted Pou in the grounds, a Mauri Stone and Tukutuku panels in the hall. It is indeed an exciting time for us all.

We continue to celebrate the diversity of our school community. Our international students inspire us with their resilience at a time when they are unable to travel home to their home countries. Well Chomchoei participated in the recent Shave for a Cure for cancer research and all of the international students were awarded badges designed by her. We also look forward to lunch out at a restaurant together early in Term Three. Our former refugee students also continue to inspire us with their resilience in embracing their new life and learning in another country.

We look forward to our 150th Celebrations at Labour Weekend. Special thanks to Mrs Smallfield and the 150th Committee for their tireless work on the arrangements. We will welcome Mai Chen as guest speaker at our opening and look forward to an exciting weekend of activities and reminiscences. Otago Girls' High School was, is, and remains, a remarkable school through the generations of young women who pass here.

# Beverley Moyle (née Lucas) OGHS student 1952 to 1956 OGHS staff 1962 to 1966

Our beloved mother, Beverley Moyle (née Lucas) passed away on 9 November, 2019. She was a former student of OGHS, attending from 1952 to 1956 and then a Mathematics teacher from 1962 to 1965. She had originally planned to return to teaching at OGHS once we were at school ourselves but made the decision to support our father in the family business, Moyles Supermarket in Green Island.

Mum always had a very strong connection to OGHS and when we were children, loved nothing more than to recount many fond memories she had of her time there. Mum came from a large family of seven children, five boys and two girls. They grew up in difficult economic times, where building work was not always easy to find for her father. Neither of her parents had been given the opportunity to attend High School, so she valued her education more than most people.

She willingly made the early start from Abbotsford by train into Dunedin City, then the daily trudge up View Street. To her, it was worth it because at OGHS she was able to reach the academic potential she never took for granted. She excelled in Mathematics and Latin and later continued to study these subjects, as well as Greek at University. She had an intrinsic work ethic, which she applied to all parts of her life, even after she left OGHS.

But it wasn't all study, Mum was also an avid sportswoman and played Outdoor Basketball for OGHS before it became known as Netball. She was also a keen tennis player and when she earned Blues her sports, she worked at extra jobs to be able to afford a new Blazer with the sports names embroidered on them, so that she wouldn't have to wear her sister's hand me downs. The blazer was one of her most treasured possessions, which she kept her entire life.

Mum made many friends whilst at OGHS, many of whom she kept in contact with until shortly before her passing. She loved attending the various OGHS Jubilees over the years and it was one of her greatest wishes to attend the 150th celebrations this year. Unfortunately, this wasn't to be, but we are sure that she will be there in spirit, a very proud old girl, of the old school.

### Isabella Cecilia Jane Ker Cochran (née Duncan) 1867-1951

OGHS student 1880 to 1884

Dux of the school in 1882 aged 15
(Isabella remained at school for two years after becoming Dux)

In March I was delighted to have a visit from Ruth Watson, a granddaughter of Isabella Duncan who attended Otago Girls' from 1880 to 1884.

Ruth had a large amount of fascinating information on Isabella, including images of her and original letters from staff at Otago Girls' and Otago Boys' attesting to Isabella's academic ability when she applied for University Scholarships in 1887. Ruth donated copies of these to the school and she wrote the following words about her grandmother.

Schools featured prominently in Isabella's life. Born on 2 October 1867 in Corstorphine, Scotland, she was the daughter of schoolmaster William Duncan and Jane, nee Dingwall. Isabella came to Dunedin as a child on the Cartsburn, arriving 14 July 1874. She began her formal education at seven, after her father became headmaster of Green Island School.

Dux of Otago Girls' High School, Isabella won the Richardson scholarship to Otago University in 1885, through a highly competitive examination. Although she wanted desperately to become a missionary doctor in India, no woman had yet studied medicine and she took a degree in arts and sciences - Latin, Mathematics, Chemistry, English and French. At University she won the first class merit prize in Junior Mathematics, in 1885, and in Senior Mathematics, which included Mechanics, in 1886, and was awarded first prize for Solutions of Chemical Problems in 1887. She began her teaching career as an undergraduate, tutoring Professor James Black's son. She worked so industriously on laboratory experiments on coal, she succumbed to an illness from gas inhalation, but eventually recovered and in 1890 she completed her M.A. being the fourth woman to graduate from Otago University.

Professor Shand wrote that her 'gentle but firm disposition' would make her an ideal teacher. She went to Nelson Girls' College where she taught Mathematics, English and Chemistry. She married a Queenstown storekeeper, William Cochran at

her parents' home in Green Island on the 4th of March 1891. They lived in Queenstown for nearly ten years where they brought up three sons, Harry, Allan and Bruce. Isabella opened a school in her home, teaching different subjects, and was highly appreciated by the towns people.

Her husband William became a farmer at Te Tua in the Waiau District, Southland, where at first they lived in a tent reinforced with timber to keep out the cold. Isabella taught timber workers' children at Papatotara and Waihoaka schools, walking miles along rutted tracks with mud up to her three sons' knees. She also played the organ for the Presbyterian and Methodist churches, and for years ran a non-denominational Sunday school in their home. After her husband's death in 1929 she moved to Colac Bay.

Her love of learning continued all her life and was passed on to many young people. Her grandchildren remember her shelves full of interesting books, her cupboards of shells, books of pressed leaves, and walks on the beach and in the bush. She was constantly instilling in us a thirst for knowledge. Grandma Tocky, as she was known by her grandchildren and others, was a firm but loving teacher until her death on the 25th January 1951 at Winton.
